### Glorious Iceland



On Tuesday 16th April, 37 Year 10 Geography students left school for Iceland. As part of the IGCSE Geography syllabus, students covered a range of topics as revision including volcanoes, dramatic waterfalls and coastal landscapes.

Landing in Iceland, the sun was out with a glorious blue sky. There was a slight change of plan to the itinerary to be able to see the new lava fields from the recent eruptions was magical due to the steam rising and snow falling.

Wednesday morning began with a very relaxing dip in the pools at the Secret Lagoon in the small village of Fludir. This natural hot spring is heated to up to 40c with the steam adding to the magical feel. Once our muscles were relaxed and fingers shrivelled, we headed north to Gullfoss. Glacial waters flow along the Hvita (White) River before

plummeting 32 metres over two tiers down into the gorge. We were able to walk from the lower path up to the upper viewing platform which gave a spectacular view of the whole waterfall. Our next stop was Geysir in the Haukadalur Valley.



The Strokkur Geyser erupts about every 8 minutes, shooting water up to a height of 20 metres. Several of the students got a little too close and received a rather unexpected drenching whilst trying to film the eruption! Cathy, our tour guide and field study tutor, explained the physical processes that were taking place here and the problems caused by so many visitors coming to this popular 'honey pot' site.

Then we travelled to the Þingvellir area which is part of a fissure zone running through Iceland. Its wide rift valley separates the North American Plate and the Eurasian Plate. It was here, in 930 AD, that the world's oldest parliament was established. We were able to walk between the steep fissure walls out into the vast rift valley. Cold winds and icy conditions made it a challenging walk.



We stayed at the wonderful Hotel Ork in the small town of Hvergerdi, about 40km away from Reykjavik. The food was plentiful and the rooms were comfortable, but the real attraction was the geothermally heated swimming pool, slides and hot tubs.



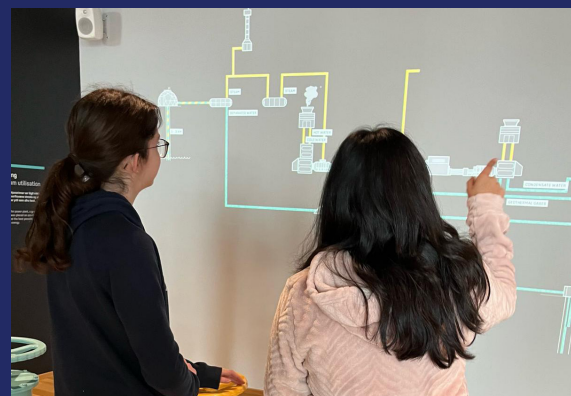
Thursday began with an early wakeup call and breakfast, then we set off on a drive along the southern coastline. First stop was Seljalandafoss waterfall. The glacial waters fall over 65 metres over old basalt sea cliffs. Gigantic icicles hung from the cliff face making it an even more impressive site. Sadly we were not able to walk behind the waterfall due to the ice.

We passed Eyjafjallajökull, which is the volcano case study for both the Year 10's. We stopped at the iconic farm and view point to discuss the impacts of the eruption of Eyjafjallajökull in 2010.



After a short stop at the Black Beach or Reynisfjara, a black basalt beach, where we had the chance to see the basalt columns created by the cooling of the lava which produces pipe-like columns, we went to the town of Vik for lunch and souvenir shopping.

On Friday morning, our first stop was to the Hellisheidi Geothermal Power Plant. We had a talk from one of the employees to explain how the Geothermal Power Plant works and why it is essential in today's climate. The exhibition was presented in interactive multimedia installations, wall displays and presentations and enabled students to examine Iceland's geothermal energy utilisation.



The final two stops of the trip were to the Bridge between the plates (Eurasian plate and the North American plate) showing the strength of plate tectonics and the conservative plate boundary. Before heading to the natural hot springs and mud puddles.

The students were a credit to the school and hopefully they have had an experience that will stay in their memories for many years to come. My thanks to Miss Carter, Ms Rendall, Ms Webb and Mr Lloyd who gave up their own time to support the trip. Mrs Le Cornu

## Charity News

### Marathon Man

Science teacher Mr Cooper ran the famous London Marathon last Sunday for the school charity Naomi House and Jacksplace and has written all about this fantastic experience.



Finally, the day for the London Marathon arrived. After all the months of training, involving getting up at 5am on a Sunday morning to complete long runs in the cold and dark, it had come to this.... standing in my pen on a cold and windy morning, trying to keep warm, waiting to be released over the starting line.

The Wheelchair race and Men's and Women's elite runners had begun their epic journey of 26.2 miles past some of London's iconic landmarks



including the Cutty Sark and Tower Bridge. Then it was our turn! The first part of the route winds slightly downhill towards the Thames. With over 50,000 runners jostling for position all trying to get into their stride maintaining your pace is key as there is a long way to go and the temptation is to go off too fast with all the adrenaline pumping around your body.

Crowds line both sides of the course, cheering so loudly that you can hear nothing else. The atmosphere is electric, time to remember the basics, take on water, take on energy gels, smile! The first half passes fairly easily as you are used to running the distance of a half marathon from all the training. Now for the second, harder part that takes a novice marathon runner like me into the unknown. At 20 miles I can feel the pace starting to dip as the legs are beginning to feel the strain. Time to dig deep and keep going as best you can. A twinge of cramp sets in. Remember the water and the gels!



By the end the finish can't come soon enough. Your pace quickens as you approach the line. Try to smile as there is a camera somewhere taking your picture. A feeling of relief consumes you as you realise you are actually going to make it. There is no better feeling than finally crossing that line. A well-deserved medal is placed around your neck and you are wrapped in silver foil to keep you warm.

I crossed the finish line in a respectable 3 hours and 20 minutes. The second half had gone a little slower than the first half but this is only my second marathon. Will I run another one? If you had asked me that when I crossed the line it would have been a definite NO. A day later, and the pain has subsided a bit, then MAYBE. Perhaps a half marathon first!

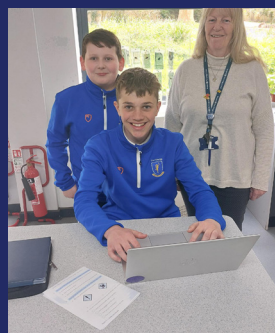
